Staff from the INDATA project at Easter Seals Crossroads will come to share information about assistive technology services and equipment available to people with disabilities. In October 2007, Easter Seals Crossroads was awarded the Indiana Assistive Technology Act grant (INDATA), which consists of state and federal funding targeted to increasing the availability of assistive technology to Hoosiers with disabilities. There are 56 programs of this type in the United States and U.S. territories. These services are available throughout the state of Indiana at no charge. Project staff will bring a variety of technology with them for hands on demonstration. If your child could benefit from any kind of assistive

technology, you won't want to miss this session in September!

The October meeting of FUSE will be a regular Q&A session on Monday, October 6. Come join us for some great conversation and resource sharing with other families.

Fall Family Activity

FUSE is planning for our annual Harvest Party to celebrate the arrival of fall! The Harvest Party will be held on Saturday, September 27, at Southeastway Park, 5624 S Carroll Road, New Palestine. The park is just over the Marion County line south of New Palestine. We had our Harvest Party here last year and everyone had a great time.

We have reserved Shelter #3 from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. The shelter is next to a playground that is fairly accessible, so the kids will be able to play throughout the evening. Take US 40 west to Mt. Comfort Rd. (600 W.) Turn left (south), go approximately 4 miles to stoplight at US 52 (Fifth Third Bank on corner). Turn right on US 52. Go approximately two miles to next stoplight which is Carroll Rd. Turn left (south) and go approximately three miles. Southeastway Park is on your right.

From Indianapolis:

Take Washington Street (US 40) east to German Church Rd. Turn right (south) and go until German Church T's into US 52 at the light. Turn left (east) on US 52 and go to the next stoplight which is Carroll Rd. Turn right (south) and go approximately three miles. The park is on your right.

Once in the park, follow the drive and continue to bear right. The shelters are numbered and shelter 3 is next to playground.

Adaptive Swim Program Offered

Registration is now underway for the FUSE adaptive swim program. Adaptive swim is being offered again in cooperation with Hancock Wellness, a service of Hancock Regional Hospital. Children with disabilities of all types are welcome. This program is geared toward non-swimmers and beginners who need to continue building their swimming skills to become independent in the water.

Adaptive swim will be held on Friday evenings from September 26 through November 21, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. at Hancock Wellness. There will be no session on October 31. Swimmers

must be between the ages of 5 and 17. Each swimmer will have a one-on-one volunteer in the water for support.

Advance registration is required for enrollment in the swim program. Registration will be \$50. Limited scholarships are available on a first come, first served basis. 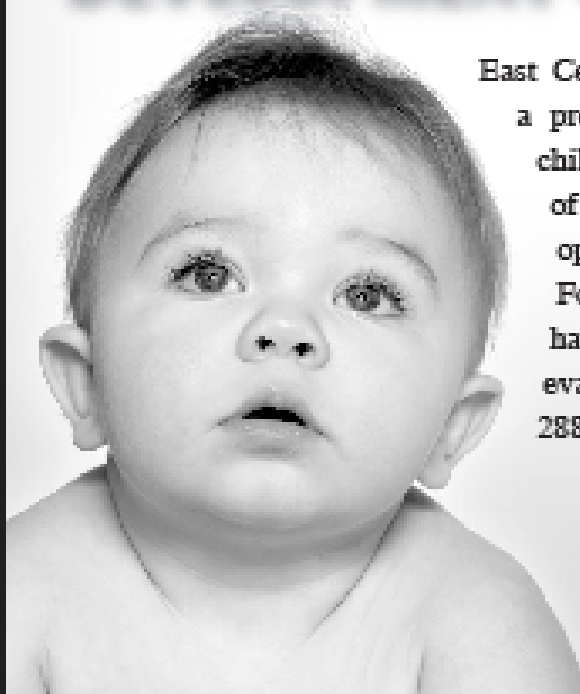

Statewide Assistive Technology Project INDATA

Indiana Family and Social Services Administration/ Division of Disability and Rehabilitative Services has contracted with Easter Seals Crossroads to be the statewide provider of the Federal Assistive Technology Act. Wade Wingler, Director of the Assistive Technology Center at Easter Seals Crossroads stated, "we have two major goals in mind; one is to get assistive technology into the hands of Hoosiers with disabilities through device demonstrations, device loans, computer recycling and alternative financing. The second goal is to provide statewide outreach educational opportunities regarding assistive technology capabilities, options and resources. We will accomplish these efforts through quarterly trainings offered statewide through [telerehab](#), an annual assistive technology conference and small group presentations. "

An 'assistive technology device' refers to any item, piece of equipment or product system (whether acquired commercially, modified, or customized) that is used to increase, maintain, or improve functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities. Examples of assistive technology include, but are not limited to, screen readers for people who are blind or visually impaired, voice input software, ergonomic and onscreen keyboards, screen magnification software, and augmentative communication devices.

Information and Referral: Anyone with questions about assistive technology may call our [Information & Referral](#) /Funding Specialist to learn more about available services and funding options.

Alternative Funding: Although there are a number of available funding sources for Assistive Technology equipment and services, there are times when an individual does not qualify for a traditional funding source. Easter Seals Crossroads has established a committee to explore the options of low-interest or extended term bank loans as well as other alternative funding mechanisms to meet Assistive Technology needs.

Device Demonstration: Many individuals benefit from experiencing a basic Assistive Technology equipment demonstration. These demonstrations are available statewide and typically allow an individual to spend 10-20 minutes with an Assistive Technology Specialist who demonstrates the basic features of the Assistive Technology device or software. (Does not result in recommendations.) [Regional AT center locations](#)

Device Loan: Easter Seals Crossroads has a growing library of Assistive Technology devices that can be [loaned](#) for up to three months.

Equipment Reutilization: In Spring 2008, Easter Seals Crossroads will launch an on-line buy/sell/trade web tool that will facilitate the reutilization of previously owned assistive technology. This free service will reduce the number of Assistive Technology devices that are abandoned when no longer needed by the original user. [Equipment Exchange System](#)

Recycled Computer Program: Donated computers are picked up from the donor, wiped of all previous data, refurbished and provided, at no charge, to individuals with disabilities who live in Indiana and have no other means of obtaining a computer. Click [here](#) for an application.

Training: Easter Seals Crossroads is sponsoring quarterly Assistive Technology Trainings, which are hosted in Indianapolis. Topics may include device-specific training, advocacy, funding, clinical techniques and other relevant topics. Additionally, trainings are offered to local Universities as well as service clubs and other interested groups. Soon, these trainings will be broadcasted, via distance education systems, to various locations in Indiana.

Conference: On September 26, 2008 Easter Seals Crossroads will sponsor a state-wide Assistive Technology Conference at the Indianapolis Convention Center. 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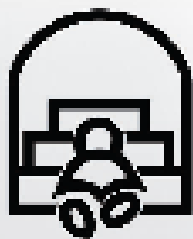

Leisure Skills Group Helps Develop Interests and Friendship

A Work in Progress LLC has launched a new opportunity for older children with Autism Spectrum Disorders and Asperger Syndrome to develop *NEW INTERESTS* and *FRIENDSHIPS!* A Work in Progress offers a new program for older children (ages 8-18) that carries out different activities every 8 weeks. It is called Leisure Skills Group *but it's really a lot more than that!* A recent flyer from A Work in Progress outlines the aims and offerings of the program:

Aims of the LSG

- Provide children with opportunities to experience everyday activities in a **non-pressure situation** (e.g. playing sports, going out to eat, going to the movies and other popular locations, developing new hobbies, and others)
- Enable children to gain an understanding of the **"unwritten rules"** that are part of being successful in these activities
- Teach children how to **handle the pressures** in these activities that may be simple for others, but can be quite daunting for children on the autism spectrum
- Provide children the opportunity to **interact with others**, and help them **develop friendships** in a safe environment that will ensure success
- Teach the art of **"small talk"** and **"pleasant conversation"**

What the LSG Offers

- **Innovation** - We strongly believe that we have a unique Group that offers significant opportunities and benefits to children, that are not readily available elsewhere
- **Variety** - Carrying out a different activity every 8 weeks allows children to participate in a wide variety of activities
- **Flexibility** - Children can come and go in our Group, depending on their activity interest and family schedules throughout the year
- **Accessibility** - We have structured our Group to make it simple, enjoyable, and an affordable option for all

DreamWorks' new comedy *"Tropic Thunder,"* which opens in theaters this week, includes a character called "Simple Jack" played by actor Ben Stiller. Simple Jack has an intellectual disability (formerly commonly referred to as "mental retardation") and is an object of derision in the film. The movie contains frequent use of the word "retard" (in fact, it is said 16 times in one scene in the film) and other insulting terms to describe this character.

The movie brings to light an issue that deserves attention. The "R-word" or "retard" has found a place in common language and seems to be generally accepted. The word hurts, even if it is not directed at a person with intellectual disabilities. It is time to take a stand against a word that has gained popularity in culture, but is offensive to so many. It is time for a simple change – stop using the "R-word."

Mocking people that we know have historically been oppressed (such as African Americans) or have some type of physical disability (such as persons with paraplegia) is, thankfully, generally not considered funny these days. Yet, some people are less enlightened in their attitudes about people with intellectual disabilities. While the "N word" is firmly prohibited, the "R-word" is still widely accepted in our homes, schoolyards, and movie theatres.

Why is that? Perhaps people are unaware of the fundamental disregard for the rights and well-being of people with intellectual disabilities in most parts of the

world. Perhaps people are unaware that intellectual disability is a condition usually developed in utero and not one for which people volunteer. Perhaps people have not read about children with Down syndrome in underdeveloped countries tied to their beds for years in filthy institutions; or about the estimated 80 percent of girls and women in this country with intellectual disabilities who are sexually abused. Perhaps people are not aware that more than six million individuals with intellectual disabilities in the United States have suffered severe consequences including: institutionalization, physical, sexual, and emotional abuse; denial of education, employment, and healthcare; and segregation and targeted hate crimes.

Maybe if only more people knew, they would not find using the R-word funny.

Language frames how we think about others. Attitudes and expectations of the public, in part, determine the degree to which children, adolescents and adults with intellectual disabilities are able to learn, work and live alongside their peers without disabilities. It is time to respect and value people with intellectual disabilities. It is time to stop using the R-word.

The adaptive swim program is geared toward non-swimmers and beginning swimmers with disabilities of all types who need to continue to build swimming skills to become independent in the water. Each swimmer is assisted in the water by a one-on-one volunteer. Swimmers from age 5 to 17 can participate.

Registration: Limited to the first 15 applicants. Deadline to register is September 12, 2008. A waiting list will be maintained if more than 15 applications are received.

Fee: \$50 payable to FUSE, Inc. (Limited scholarships are available. Mark below if needed. You will be contacted to discuss details. A partial fee may be requested if scholarship requests exceed available funds, but we will work with you on your needs.)

Schedule: 8 weeks, Friday evenings from 6:30 to 7:30. September 26 through November 21 (no swim October 31) at Hancock Wellness, 888 W New Road, Greenfield.
